KINDERGARTEN or 3RD YEAR MONTESSORI

Montessori primary is a 3-year program; think of it as preschool, pre-K and K. Our hope is that our upcoming kindergarten students will stay at MMS to complete their primary Montessori experience with us. During the first two years of Montessori primary, complex skills like reading and writing are broken up into their component parts and presented to the child in individual lessons that are easily practiced and absorbed. Children master these parts by having enough time for experimentation and repetition. They develop self-confidence and a joy of learning when they are free to follow their interests and choose their own interesting, challenging and developmentally appropriate "work". But it's in the third year, the capstone year, that we begin to see the culmination and integration of the preceding two years. It's in the 3rd year that we see children "explode" into reading, writing and math. This is important because school success largely depends on children having good basic academic skills and good study and work habits. We also see children starting to take on the roles of classroom mentors and peace mediators because they've been practicing for the previous two years! The kindergarten year is the most fruitful; everything that's been developing underground suddenly blooms and the Montessori materials within the Montessori prepared environment aid in the integration of all this learning.

CLASS NEWS

South classroom: Happy New Year! This month we will study South America and begin our Polar Unit; Arctic, Antarctic and Colorado winters and continue to study landforms. What animals do you see around your neighborhood in the winter? What are some of your favorite winter stories and activities?
